Believe The Light

The verse Isaiah 9:2 from the King James Version of the Bible reads, "The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined." This verse is a part of the larger prophetic passage of Isaiah 9, which speaks of the coming of a great king who will bring hope and deliverance to the people of Israel.

In the context of the book of Isaiah, this verse is part of a larger passage in which the prophet Isaiah speaks words of hope and promise to the people of Israel. Throughout the book of Isaiah, the prophet speaks of the coming of a messianic figure who will bring salvation and deliverance to the people.
